ERIC THE ICE RACER

2010 Magnum Fine Printing Ice Series Minden, Ontario sanctioned by CASC-OR

This past winter I decided to try my hand at racing on ice. It sounded like a lot of fun and it could be a great way to get behind the wheel in the winter. This race series didn't disappoint me by any means!

The races took place at the Minden fairgrounds on a flooded surface made possible by the Minden Kinsmen. They do an excellent job of setting up the facility for the winter. There are a lot of cold days and nights spent building and maintaining the track so it is ready to go on the weekends.

The race series ran from Jan 23/24 through six weekends to Feb 27/28. A Canadian Automobile Sport Club regional "C" license, a current SA or M rated helmet, snow tires, and a cheap car are the only requirements. We made it to all the events except for both the races on Sat. Jan. 30 when a rusted out spring perch prompted a drive to Toronto for a new strut. We got the car fixed that night and raced on Sunday. That weekend I also discovered that ratchet straps could be used as spring compressors.

I was entered in Class 2 this season with a 1987 Toyota Corolla (#147). The car used to belong to my brother's girlfriend, and was purchased for \$150. That seems to be about right for an ice-racing car, and some are probably worth much less than that!

There are two main types of classes in ice racing, rubber to ice and metal to ice. Both of these groups

are split into separate classes. Class 1 for RWD cars, Class 2 for FWD with a wheelbase under 2415mm, Class 3 is FWD over 2415mm and Class 4 is for AWD vehicles. There are also classes 11,12,etc... for a second driver in the same car.

Rubber to ice uses off the shelf snow tires, which have been tractionized. Tractionizing consists of spinning a wheel and tire mounted on the car against two spiked rollers. This chews up the tread to the point of being sponge like - in effect adding lots of siping to the tire. There is something satisfying about mutilating a brand new pair of Blizzaks in this fashion. On the first weekend I tried qualifying on un-tractionized tires and I sat at the start line spinning the wheels while watching the others drive away. You MUST do this to your tires for rubber to ice racing. The rubber

classes reward driving skill and finesse. There is extremely little traction available and to do well means driving very smoothly and under self-imposed controlled conditions. I heard it compared to dirt track racing where there isn't a set "line". You have to move all over the track to try and find the most grip. This makes for some pretty interesting ways of getting around the corners. Along with learning how to drive a FWD car in the winter, this was probably the trickiest thing to try and figure out. I still have a long way to go also, as I finished the season 10th in class. Still, not bad for a Rookie.

Metal to ice is further divided into street stud and race stud. Both groups use a spec tire. Street stud classes run on studded Hankook snow tires. They provide quite a bit more traction and allow the drivers follow a "racing line" instead of trying to find grip, as is the case in rubber classes. Horsepower also starts to become a factor in street stud. Race stud is where it gets really fun to watch. These cars are required to have full roll cages and safety gear where as the other classes don't. Lots of power and grip mean that they get going a lot faster than the other classes. Their tires are also purpose made for ice racing. The

first two weekends of the season these classes couldn't run as there wasn't enough ice built up. It is a treat getting to race right after these guys because they tear up the ice surface so much. There is a lot of grip for a few laps.

This winter the weather also went to extremes. On the second weekend, we arrived at the track on Saturday to see -31 degrees C. My trusty Corolla fired right up (with multiple pumps of the gas pedal) but some of the competitors spent some time towing their racers up and down the pits trying to bump start their frozen cars. When the temperature gets into this range you have to bring everything you want to function the next day into the hotel room. (Note - you can thaw out a floor jack by setting it on top of your car's engine and closing the hood.) The opposite extreme was on the last two weekends of the season. By the end of the last Sunday, after the race stud cars ran, there was a fair bit of exposed dirt at one end of the track. It was a good thing the wipers still worked on the Corolla. This is part of the challenge in the series as well. The track changes from day to day and even from lap to lap because the rubber tires polish the ice and push loose snow to the outside of the corners during the races.

I really enjoyed running the series this past winter and encourage everyone to give it a try. It would be great to see some more folks from our club in the standings next winter. The series is competitive wheel to wheel racing but the drivers are also there to have fun. I met a lot of great people last winter and made some new friends. I'll definitely be back next winter to try and improve my results and hope to see some of you there too.
