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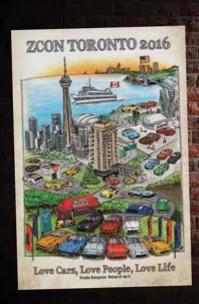

o refresh your memory, last year's Z-Fest had plenty of miserable rain all morning of the event and it really put a damper on the turnout for the day. A good bunch of the cars that pre-registered and paid for the car show and even our food truck guy decided not to show up due to the rain.

The Hamilton Museum of Steam & Technology is a great venue for a car show so we decided to return there for Z-Fest 2019, fully expecting/hoping for better weather conditions. Well we were disappointed again! It rained really hard the night before Z-Fest but on the good side, the morning forecast did not call for the rain to continue. As I drove out early in the morning, the roads were still wet but the skies looked clear and promising signs were all around. As evidenced by last year's site conditions, the rain did not make the grassy areas off limits to park the cars so work started in earnest around 7:30 a.m. to set up the parking areas for each of the various Zed car classes. Members of the Club Executive and the many volunteers present went about doing their jobs of erecting the upright flags and our big pop-up tent, installing the club banners at the road entrance, setting up the car show entrance gate, registration desk, merchandise displays, door prizes and putting out all the car show awards too. Everything was pretty well done and ready to go as 9:00 a.m. rolled by to officially open Z-Fest.

The overnight rain had done the damage though as there was a slow but steady flow of cars showing up for Z-Fest. The front entrance road into the parking areas didn't have any of the normally long line up of cars arriving in bunches to register for the event. Some of us even went as far as to call or email the members to let them know the rain had stopped and the skies were bright and sunny out. With the mid-morning arrival of our DJ to supply the music and our food truck to feed everyone some delicious BBQ smoked meat sandwiches and the like, the morning passed by quite smoothly at a pace where nobody got stressed out over anything.

Ever since he became a member of Ontario Z-Car, Harry Wells from Port Colborne, has been our largest supporter of Z-Fest. He usually shows up with his family fleet of 5 to 6 Zeds, driven by himself, wife, son, daughter, and the in-laws. Harry's Zeds range from a 240Z all the way to the 370Z. He has taken home his share of Z-Fest awards too over the years. I couldn't believe he wasn't coming to Z-Fest due to the rain in his area and the drive up as I read his email sent to me early, the morning of the car show. That wasn't the case in Hamilton at the time and before I could send an email to inform him of that fact, I received his follow up email saying he changed his mind and they were all on their way. We were sure glad to see his fleet arrive for the show.

We closed the entrance off about 12:30 p.m. as little to no new arrivals showed. The car show registrants were then reminded to fill in their ballots and submit them for tabulation of the awards. Final count for the number of registered cars topped out at 94 this year. It was a bit disappointing but not unexpected due to the wet weather the night before and the forecast for more rain to come at the end of the day. Under the right weather conditions, Z-Fest numbers have historically been in the neighbourhood of 130+ cars. I have included a breakdown of the car show numbers for each generation of Zed this year, just for interest sake. The most populated individual class was still the S30 one by a small margin, with the Z32s, Z33s and the Z34s totalling up over half of the cars registered. We also had 67 cars pre-register for Z-Fest this year which was great for me as it reduces the paperwork and makes the registration line up, the day of the show a lot shorter. Much appreciated.

Ontario Z-Car would like to send out a big Thank-You to Nissan Canada for their ongoing support and sponsorship of Z-Fest over the many past years. In addition to providing us with some very generous financial support, they are also quite happy to bring out cars from both their past and current model line-up. This year we saw a heritage Z32



300ZX drive up and a 50th Anniversary special edition 370Z put on display at Z-Fest. Thanks go out to Nathalie Quesnel, Events and Sponsorship Manager, Marketing Department of Nissan Canada for attending our event along with some very enthusiastic Nissan employees too. They came with and gave out some Nissan swag, golf shirts, energy bars and bottles of water which were gladly scooped up by the attendees. The Nissan photographer re-positioned the special Anniversary 370Z by the exit from the field and individually photographed most of the Zeds as they passed by beside it. I have those pics if anyone is interested in finding their Zed too.

The hardest working person at Z-Fest that day was our Social Media Director, Diane Dale. She was looking for a way to identify or associate any driver in the show with their Zed, to post the pics on Facebook or Instagram. We added a couple of new data fields in the registration form but that info would not be easy for her to access the day of the car show. About noon hour, I saw Diane and asked how she was doing. She had figured it all out by taking pictures of every car in the show, their show card information and their licence plate. What a busy morning she must have had! The ballots started to come in after lunch which started her next big task. With me calling out the car number information on every ballot, Diane was madly keying in the data onto the PC, to compile all the ballot information. Each ballot had up to 14 entries to record and in the end, there were over 70 ballots tabulated, in just over an hour. A quick data sort of the spreadsheet info produced the award winners for each of the car classes. Around 3:00 p.m., thirty awards were announced and handed out to the first and second place finishers in each class, for both stock and modified categories. Was Diane taking a break during the award ceremony? Of course not, she was front and centre, taking pictures of every single award winner accepting their trophy. Pictures of the winners and their award winning cars were posted up by Diane on our social media sites later in the evening and

the next day. Thanks Diane for doing such a fantastic job of posting the car show results so quickly!

It was amazing to see how fast all the cars vacated the field after the awards were finished. It was a good thing too as the skies were getting cloudy and the rain forecasted to start later in the afternoon looked like it wasn't far off.

We haven't lined up a venue yet for Z-Fest 2020 but with good weather, we will be aiming to get back to 130+ Zeds showing up. We will be counting on you. See you there with your Zee! (Zed didn't rhyme so had to go American spelling.)

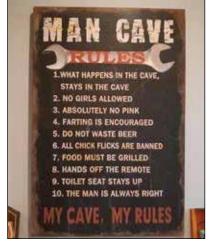
Brian's wife Sue opened her private gallery of original art in their beautiful home as well. We also got a little educat-

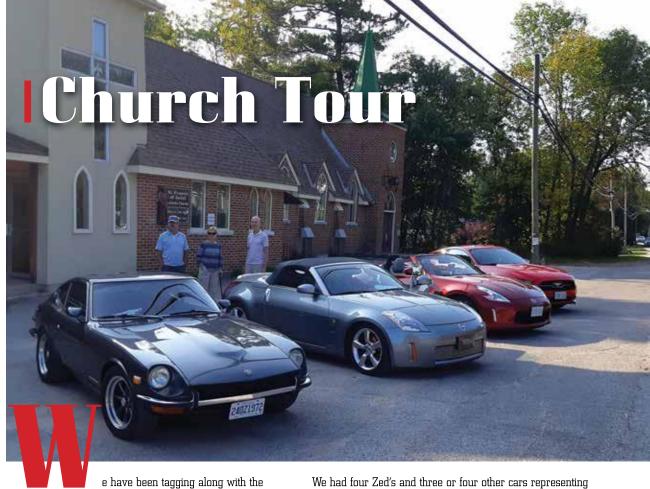

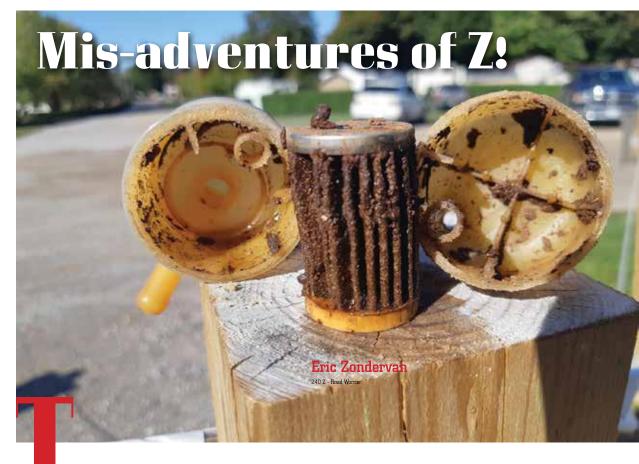

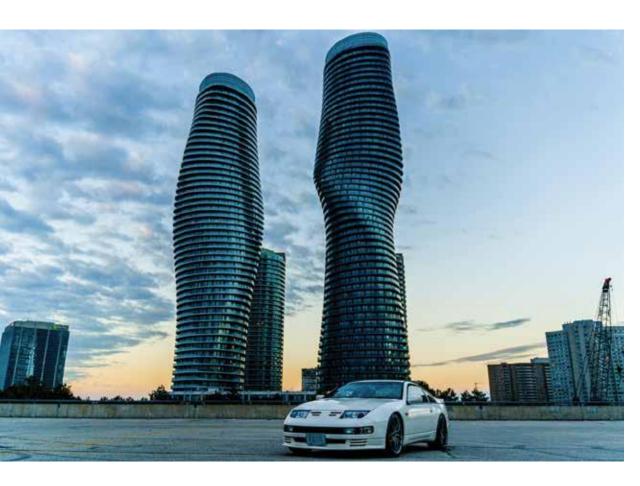
My first problem was on the way to Z Con when I picked up some dirty fuel just before getting to Branson. I was able to

limp into Branson mostly on three cylinders. The next tank of name-brand gas seemed to solve the problem. At the Kawartha tour I noticed my signal lights doing strange things, then on the way home I realized I was not getting any charge. I was going to go down to the city, but the cottage is closer and that's where I do all my repairs, so I just made it before the battery died. I jumped in the truck and took my passenger down to the city. When I got around to checking it a few days later, it was a coincidental combination of a signal light bulb making poor connection and a fuse blowing.

My next incident was the morning of the OZC golf tournament. I filled up at Costco early in the morning, pulled out onto Highway 11 and once again was running on 3 cylinders. I couldn't even get to a hundred kilometres an hour so I nursed it back to the cottage and jumped in the truck and still made it to the tournament on time. I looked into that a few days later , ran some fuel into a jug, fiddled around a bit, put everything back together and it ran fine. Never did find a cause. I drove about 1,500 kilometres before I did anything about it, a bit nervous all the way, especially going to Ottawa and Montreal because there had to be a reason, like dirt in the tank. Finally, on the weekend before Thanksgiving, I pulled the gas tank out and flushed it thoroughly. Put it back together with fresh gas, and it still ran poorly.

I picked up a new fuel filter but didn't get a chance to install it. On the way to the Western Meeting, in October, it got to running so badly I could hardly make it up a long hill. Finally I stopped in a parking lot just north of Guelph and put the new fuel filter on. As soon as I started the car it filled up with dirt. I took it off and shook the dirt out, and it's been running great ever since.

On the way back the car was handling well and running in prime condition. I live in South Mississauga and once I got into the city I noticed that the car was a bit dirty and needed a wash. I decided that I needed to clean the car prior to putting it away and headed to the local coin wash which is attached to a Petro Canada. I decided that I wouldn't get any gas and instead wait for the prices to drop, so I parked at the side of the gas bar. I went in for some loonies for the coin wash and some refreshments and came out ready to take care of my prized possession. I attempted to start my car but was surprised by the most feared sound when you turn a car key; the dreaded "click,click" and the dashboard flickering. Undaunted, and familiar with the temperamental behaviours associated with the Z32, I turned the key again and nothing. I got a similar response from the Z for which, in frustration, I dropped my head and cursed under my breath. At this point I looked up and noticed a number of onlookers unaware of my situation but enamored with an apparent "clean" Slicktop Fairlady. I said hello, took the compliments and kept it moving.

I popped the hood, stepped out of the car hoping to investigate and perhaps clean up the 'Gremlins'? First thing I checked of course was the battery connections, and it all looked well. No concerns except a hissing sound that I couldn't identify. I looked closely for steam, radiator fluid or perhaps fuel leaking and found nothing. I did a circle check of the engine bay and found nothing. I was brought right back to my Redtop battery that was the source of the hissing. I was now fearful and leaned cautiously forward to confirm what I thought. In the back of my head I recalled

Vuk of AMS telling me that a Redtop was the cause of his Corporate Z going up in flames while it was parked in his garage at home. I was entirely sure I didnt want that happening in my face so I took my time inspecting and looked for any signs indicating a possible explosion. The battery was hissing and looked like it was leaking with white liquid flowing over the sides. The battery was very hot to the touch and obviously dead. I now had a dead Z in a no parking area at a gas station. I needed to move it out of the way. My admirers were now gone and was left with the gas attendant or push it my self into a spot about 50 feet away. I decided to give it a go myself and pushed the Z into the spot. Thank God for gas stations with fairly level pavement.

I was now stuck on a weekend, all stores closed, hungry and tired. Who can I call who loves these cars as much as I do and has more patience than I do? CYRIL OF COURSE!!!! I called Cyril who was at dinner with his family but offered his spare battery which was in his garage. Problem was how would I get it? No problem, Cyril offered to bring the battery to me. I was in South Mississauga and Cyril was in Norh Brampton a distance of over 30 kms. He arrived in approximately 40 minutes, we switched the batteries and started my Z on the first crank. It was a sigh of relief but now we had to deal with the Red top, which was less than 1 year old. I thanked Cyril, put the battery in the Z, and went home.

The next day I called in the battery as faulty and was told that I can come by to exchange it for a new battery. I exchanged the battery but have yet to replace the old Motomaster Cyril gave me for the new Redtop. I guess I'm a little nervous.





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
